A COMMUNITY OF CARE ADMISSIONS

In 2024, we welcomed 1,429 animals who had nowhere else to turn. We gave lifesaving second chances to 1,017 cats, 305 dogs, 32 rabbits and a few other species.

Animals arrive at our door in many ways – as strays, transfers from partner organizations, rescues from humane investigations and municipal police, and as owner surrenders when their family can no longer care for them.

Animal Friends is known for admitting animals with some of the most complex medical and behavioral challenges.

Not every shelter is able to do what we do. It requires a highly committed and skilled staff and volunteers with an unparalleled combination of patience and passion to give our residents the highest level of care.

A great deal of thought is put into every animal that comes in. The question is always: What can we do to give each one of them their best chance to be adopted and to live a healthy and contented life?

SHELTER MEDICINE

Keeping our population healthy is a top priority and it begins immediately at intake. Every animal is medically evaluated to ensure they get appropriate care right from the start. If an animal is unwell in any way, our shelter medicine staff work together to develop a treatment plan to help them get well and stay well while they are here.

In 2024, we performed dozens of dental surgeries and mass removal surgeries and treated residents for parasites, skin diseases and a wide variety of other conditions and illnesses, as well as injuries.

Preventive care is an equally important part of our work. When our animals leave us to go to their new homes, we send them off in the best of health. All of our residents are vaccinated, microchipped and undergo spay or neuter surgery before becoming available for adoption.

BEHAVIOR

Our animals' behavioral health is as important to their well-being as their physical health. Just like people, animals can be affected by their environment. Some have been neglected, abused or abandoned. Some have lived on the streets as strays. Others come to us from hoarding cases.

We assess each animal's temperament, their likes and their dislikes. Some animals need more time and attention than others to adjust to shelter life and require our behavior specialists, caregivers and foster families to be especially patient and meet them where they are in their journey. Some animals need socialization to help them live comfortably. Others benefit from one-on-one training.

ENRICHMENT

Shelter environments can be quite stressful for some animals. The kennels can be noisy and overstimulating . . . and even boring. To keep our residents engaged, we provide them with daily enrichment activities designed to address their species-specific needs.

Scent games allow dogs to use their instinctive sniffing skills. Cats find toy birds dancing from a string on a stick very tempting – they're hunters by nature. And our resident rabbits get crunchy pinecone treats from the trees around our campus to address their innate need to chew.

In 2024, thousands of hours were invested in enrichment activities to help reduce stress, redirect extra energy, relieve boredom and add to our animals' overall quality of life. When they engage with their environment more, they tend to be less agitated, less fearful, more peaceful and ready to be adopted.





A COMMUNITY OF LOVE

PLACEMENTS

Congratulations to everyone who welcomed home a new family member in 2024. In total, we provided a second chance for 1,361 animals with almost 50% of our adopted residents having the benefit of living with a foster family prior to their adoption.

We match people with companion animals for the best chance of success based on conversational counseling, lifestyle compatibility, the number of humans and pets in the household and on-site meetings. We do everything possible to set pets and people up for success.

We don't always know a lot about the lives our animals lived before coming under our care. One thing is certain, we stand firm in our commitment to give every animal a second chance at a safe and healthy life. The measure of success for saving lives is the live release rate. In 2024, Animal Friends' live release rate was a laudable 96%. It reflects the fact that we don't give up. It's what sets us apart.

A COMMUNITY OF SUPPORT

PET RETENTION & CHOW WAGON

The number of people facing food insecurity in our region is rising, And if people are hungry, so are their pets. Animal Friends' Chow Wagon Pet Food Bank supports families and their pets by providing free pet food on a monthly basis. This service is intended to ease the financial cost associated with pet care and help promote pet retention thereby reducing surrenders to animal shelters. In addition to individuals, we also work with 40 food pantry partners to ensure food is accessible across the region.

In 2024, Pet Retention made its programming more equitable to communities and individuals by establishing a standardized distribution process for our onsite pet food pantry days. The new system increased efficiency and ensured proper distribution through pre-determined package sizes based on the number of animals cared for by an individual pet owner.

Last year we also addressed transportation barriers and improving accessibility to vet care. We are especially proud that the Uber Pet transportation program we developed for families who struggle to find pet-friendly transportation was recognized nationally.

HUMANE INVESTIGATIONS

Humane Investigations was committed to transition, training, and rebuilding in 2024, poising the department for necessary and positive change in 2025. Although without a sworn-in humane officer for most of the year, the team remained committed to supporting the community through empathetic listening, education, and diligently offering resources and referrals.

Through strengthening relationships with community officials, the team also successfully navigated unresolved cases affecting animals who were being boarded long-term, resulting in the ability to adopt them into loving homes. We look forward to expanding the team in 2025 with the swearing in of officers, and the building of relationships in the community.

A COMMUNITY OF HEALING

HOWARD ASH ANIMAL WELLNESS CENTER & CLINIC

As with any animal welfare organization, admissions and adoptions are at the core of what we do. But our vision of a humane and compassionate future for every animal friend calls us to provide a safety net of services for ever changing and growing needs of the pets and people of our community.

Last year was a year of growth and refinement for our community clinic. With the tremendous need for affordable veterinary care in Allegheny and surrounding counties, we increased our wellness and sick appointments by 5% and increased our special procedure surgeries by 30%.

And to help keep pets healthy and up to date on lifesaving vaccines, over the summer we doubled the number of clinics we hosted in communities where affordable care was a need.

To improve efficiency and provide a stronger focus on client services, we implemented a new software system that combined multiple systems that we had utilized previously. The new system also allows for a client pet portal and text messaging. Additionally, we focused on answering calls live whenever possible, providing direct support on the phone more immediately. These changes have improved communication with clients and have helped with expediting the care that their pets need.

A COMMUNITY OF COMPASSION ANIMAL FRIENDS FOR VETERANS

Animal Friends for Veterans (AFFV) staff hear from veterans that their companion animals are what gives them purpose and keeps them going every day. Knowing their animals are waiting for them with wagging tails or hungry meows gives veterans something to look forward to each day, despite the physical and emotional pain many of these heroes are experiencing.

We're proud to have more than doubled our Animal Friends for Veterans program in both the number of companion animals adopted and the number of veterans whose lives we touched through the program.

We expanded our reach through partnerships with the Veteran's Administration, Career Link and Operation Vet Now. We also continued to collaborate with local universities such as Robert Morris' Student Veterans office and initiated new partnerships with the Student Veterans Association at the University of Pittsburgh and the veterans' services offices at Westmoreland and Beaver County Community Colleges.

Together this year, the Veterans Ambassador Council and AFFV staff attended 38 events in total, hosted by local legislators, suicide prevention organizations and addiction treatment centers, among other organizations. Staff also delivered a presentation to the VA hospital's trauma based recovery unit to share program information with their employees.

THERAPETS & PALS

Therapets, our animal assisted therapy program, celebrates the healing power of animals. Each of our Therapets teams participate in specialized training and a certification process. Accompanied by their human handlers, the dogs, cats and rabbits visit hospitals, schools, nursing homes, treatment centers and hospice facilities throughout our region, bringing comfort and affection to people in need. Therapets teams were also invited to participate in the Humane Education curriculum through the addition of the "We Met a Therapets Team" school-based program.

For students, our PALS program engages youths in reading to a companion animal as a way to enhance literacy skills and foster a love of reading. PALS teams also participated in the "We Time Weekends" family reading program at Animal Friends.



A COMMUNITY OF LEARNING **HUMANE EDUCATION**

Whether increasing volunteer participation, developing new educational programming, or expanding our reach into the community, the Humane Education department grew by leaps and bounds last year.

With a focus on empathy, respect and the humane treatment of animals, in addition to offering programs on-site at Animal Friends as well as in schools, Humane Education tripled our offerings for scouts this year, adding programs for Daisy and Cadette Girl Scouts. Additionally, Humane Education's presence in the community grew, sharing our message where it will have a direct impact on future animal advocates. The team participated in community vaccine clinics where they distributed children's books about animal welfare and shared information about bite prevention, attended Halloween trunk-or-treat events to spotlight our adoptable black cats, and the participated in a Community Day at the Science Center which focused on how to safely interact with dogs.

The Humane Education team was awarded a generous grant provided by the Latham Foundation in 2024 which funded the development of a new and exciting Animal Advocacy Summit for high school students, to be offered in the coming year.

VOLUNTEERS

One thing we know without a doubt is that our volunteers are a loyal, passionate and an incredibly giving group of animal lovers. Last year they donated an extraordinary 373,575 hours of their time – the equivalent of 173 full time employees – to help us carry out our lifesaving mission.

Our volunteers assist us in every way, every day. They help to feed the animals and clean the kennels. They exercise, socialize, enrich and rehabilitate our residents. They administer medicine, help to maintain our 75-acre campus and assist with events and special projects. They are business leaders and consultants, retirees and teachers, veterans and college students, Board members and Committee members and most importantly, they are very much appreciated members of the Animal Friends family.

Without our volunteers, we simply could not be the successful, progressive organization we are today.

FOSTERS

Fostering accounted for over 75% of the total volunteer hours donated to Animal Friends last year. These are our superheroes – the 221 dedicated foster volunteers who opened their homes and their hearts to care for 547 cats, 186 dogs, 31 rabbits – and even a few birds – who were waiting to be adopted.

Some foster animals are healing from surgery and need a calm, quiet place to recover. Others are stressed by the shelter environment or depressed by having been here a long time and need downtime in a homey atmosphere. Even animals in hospice care can live in a loving home in our foster hospice program, which was launched in 2024.

Animal Friends is also fortunate to have some of our dogs fostered off-campus at SCI Fayette, in our successful prison program where selected inmates are paired with dogs that they live, play and train with until the animal is adopted. It's a win-win for animals and inmates alike.

In 2024, over a thousand attendees, hundreds of volunteers and dozens of sponsors, along with Animal Friends staff, joined together to celebrate the animal-human bond and to raise the funds needed to carry out our lifesaving mission.

It is the generosity of our donors that makes it possible for Animal Friends to do the work we do such as taking on the toughest medical and behavioral cases and providing community resources to help keep pets out of the sheltering system and in their homes.

There are many ways to support Animal Friends' lifesaving mission. Last year, Animal Friends received an extremely generous gift in the form of a beguest from the estate of Marlene Cornelius. Marlene was an avid supporter of Animal Friends for over 33 years as a volunteer, event coordinator, adopter, member of the Board of Directors and much more.

The impact she will have on the lives of animals for decades to come through the programs she funded, our Save My Pet Fund and Humane Education, is immense.

Marlene is a very special part of Animal Friends' history, and we wouldn't be where we are today without her generous support, friendship and dedication. We are honored by Marlene's legacy of love and compassion.

We remember Marlene, with her beloved dog Zoey, as an incredible friend whose generosity will continue to make a difference.




MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS

Late last year, the Communications team began the huge undertaking of re-designing Animal Friends' website.
